V. Recommendations

A. <u>Membership</u>: Committee recommends revising current membership for a more equitable representation of Leeward faculty/staff. <u>Current membership voting power</u> is overwhelming with

faculty representation with only 3 out of 19 voting members as staff. When considering equitable distribution of voting power, several scenarios present themselves:

<u>Scenario #1</u>: Revisit Membership after creation of Staff Senate to recalibrate faculty and staff representation and voting rubric/power in a manner that reflects the campus employee population equitably.

Scenario #2: Revise membership: 50% faculty vote and 50% staff vote.

- B. <u>Purpose</u>: Rethink the purpose of Campus Council to widen scope beyond planning and budgetary matters. This may include a Campus Congress (forum to explore, discuss, and debate crucial issues facing the college).
- C. <u>Task</u>: What should this body do for the Campus? Create standing committees (i.e., Strategic Plan, Environmental Sustainability.) Continue support for the establishment of the Staff Senate,

CPC reviews recommendations from all participatory governance committees. CPC promotes collegial dialogue and ensures inclusive and equitable participatory governance structures and operations. The College Planning Council makes recommendations to the College President.

- Convene the chairs of all the Participatory Governance (PG) committees during Fall Flex Week to facilitate collaboration in accomplishing the college's strategic goals and objectives.
- Review the goal progress and self-assessment results of all committees.
- Coordinate the meeting schedules of all PG committees for the subsequent academic year.
- Review recommendations of PG committees and make final recommendation to the college president regarding organizational structures and functions, participatory governance structures, college planning, budgetary priorities, and resource allocations.
- Hear program review appeals from programs recommended for reduction or discontinuance.
- Hear program improvement plans mandated in the program review process and provide advisement to those programs.
- Coordinate the revision of all college-wide plans, including the **Educational Master** Plan. Strategic Plan. Strategic Enrollment Plan, Technology Master Plan, and

Facilities Master Plan.
